



1 Introduction

1.1 It is Brookside policy that all children wear school uniform when attending school, or when participating in a school-organised event outside normal school hours. We provide a complete list of the items needed for school uniform in our school prospectus.

2 Aims and objectives

2.1 Our policy on school uniform is based on the notion that school uniform:

- promotes a sense of pride in the school;
- engenders a sense of community and belonging towards the school;
- is practical and smart;
- identifies the children with the school;
- prevents children from coming to school in fashion clothes that could be distracting in class;
- makes children feel equal to their peers in terms of appearance;
- is regarded as suitable wear for school and good value for money by most parents;
- is designed with health and safety in mind.

3 School Uniform

3.1 Our school uniform can be purchased directly from school incorporating the school logo or, if parents prefer, a plain alternative in the same colours may be obtained from outside stockists.

Boys:

- Grey/Black trousers or shorts.
- White polo T-shirt.
- Royal Blue school sweatshirt
- Optional school fleece
- Black shoes

Girls:

- Grey/black skirt, pinafore dress or trousers
- White polo shirt
- Royal Blue school sweatshirt or cardigan
- Blue and White gingham dress – summer
- Optional school fleece
- Please ensure shoe heels are less than 1.5 inches
- Black shoes

PE Kit:

- White school T-shirt
- Shorts – royal blue/
- Pair of plimsolls/trainers
- Pair of socks if tights are worn
- Hairband /clips to tie back long hair
- Navy blue Jogging bottoms for winter
- PE kit should be in a draw string bag

- Stocks of school Polo T-shirts, PE T-shirts, Sweatshirts and Sweat cardigans, Fleeces, sun hats, PE bags and book-bags are held in school. All these items have the school badge.
- Parents of children starting in foundation will be given an opportunity to buy school uniform during the induction meetings. Uniform can also be purchased/ordered via Mrs Peatman.

4 Jewellery

4.1 On health and safety grounds we do not allow children to wear jewellery in our school. The exceptions to this rule are ear-ring studs in pierced ears, and small objects of religious significance, such as a crucifix on a chain or Kara bracelet. We ask the children to remove these objects during PE and games. It is not acceptable to cover them with a plaster.

5 Extreme haircuts

5.1 The school does not permit children to have 'extreme' haircuts that could serve as a distraction to other children. Long hair should be tied back.

6 Footwear

6.1 The school wants all children to grow into healthy adults. We believe that it is dangerous for children to wear shoes that have platform soles or high heels, so we do not allow children to wear such shoes in our school. Neither do we allow children to wear trainers to school; this is because we think that this footwear is appropriate for sport or for leisurewear, but is not in keeping with the smart appearance of a school uniform. We require all children to wear shoes as stated in the uniform list.

7 The role of parents

7.1 We ask all parents who send their children to our school to support the school uniform policy. We believe that parents have a duty to send their children to school correctly dressed and ready for their daily schoolwork. One of the responsibilities of parents is to ensure that their child has the correct uniform, and that it is clean and in good repair. However, we would NOT discriminate against a child or family having financial difficulties in providing uniform. A School Uniform Grant may be available to parents who qualify and parents can contact Notts County Council on 0844 980 8080.

7.2 If any parent would like the school to modify the uniform policy, they should make representation, in the first instance, to the headteacher. The school welcomes children from all backgrounds and faith communities. If there are serious reasons, for example on religious grounds, why parents want their child to wear clothes that differ from the school uniform, the school will look sympathetically at such requests.

7.3 If you are unable to comply with the policy for a reason then a note should be sent to the class teacher explaining why this is the case and when you anticipate your child will be back in full uniform.

8 The role of governors

8.1 The governing body supports the headteacher in implementing the school uniform policy. It considers all representations from parents regarding the uniform policy and liaises with the headteacher to ensure that the policy is implemented fairly and with sensitivity.

8.2 It is the governors' responsibility to ensure that the school uniform meets all regulations concerning equal opportunities.

8.3 Governors ensure that the school uniform policy helps children to dress sensibly, in clothing that is hardwearing, safe and practical.

9 Monitoring and review

9.1 The governing body monitors and reviews the school uniform policy through its committee work by:

- seeking the views of parents, to ensure that they agree with and support the policy;
- considering, with the headteacher, any requests from parents for individual children to have special dispensation with regard to school uniform;
- requiring the headteacher to report to the governors on the way the school uniform policy is implemented.
